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The [Vienna Migration Conference 2024](#) (VMC2024) convenes on 22-23 October, amidst pivotal events shaping European migration policy. Over these two days, more than 250 decision-makers and migration practitioners from government, international organisations, academia, and civil society will engage in discussions on labour migration, strategies for safer routes and handling irregular arrivals, public sentiment on migration, and the work ahead to start implementing the New EU Pact on Migration and Asylum. Informed by recent EU elections and ongoing negotiations to shape the new five-year mandate, this ninth edition of VMC will again be livestreamed, connecting the global migration community to these critical discussions.

This session explores good practices, innovative strategies, and obstacles in scaling up public-private partnerships to address the comprehensive scope of migration cooperation, including skills development and mobility, reintegration and integration.

On the brink of a new era: Navigating the future of tech in migration

New technological tools have burst onto the scene in recent years and are considered full of potential in terms of how they can contribute to migration management, whether for border management, integration or asylum placement purposes. At the same time, their use has triggered concerns about the operational, ethical and fundamental rights implications. This side event provides a 360-degree review of where we could be going and what to have in mind as we go forward.

Senior officials share practical perspectives on fostering effective partnerships, overcoming challenges like skill development, qualification recognition, and protecting workers' rights.

Hardly any other debate on migration is as controversial as external processing. Beyond ideological blinders, this panel examines external processing from a scientific, practical, political and legal perspective, exploring commonalities and defining red lines.

Divisive debates on migration in Europe do not exist in a vacuum but are situated in a broader context of increasing polarisation and radicalism across the political spectrum. A battle of narratives on both the global and domestic scenes has made a middle ground increasingly hard to find, with the shift to the right in the recent EU elections and ongoing US presidential campaign cases in point. This spotlight session walks us through some of the most worrying trends on both sides of the Atlantic, and what is needed to overcome them.

People on the move: Measures to improve outreach and support

With more than 63,000 people dead or missing while migrating in the last decade, the call for safe and legal pathways for migrants and people in need of international protection is growing, globally as well as in Europe. But what options are on the table and to what degree could US Safe Mobility Offices serve as a blueprint for Europe? This session reviews initiatives and structures designed to reach and assist migrants in different parts of the world and discusses replicability and scalability to address dangerous journeys and facilitate access to pathways.

Ten building blocks for the Pact: are we on track for a resourceful and flexible European migration system?

As the gridlock over EU asylum rules has been broken, the European Commission has a very ambitious agenda ahead to make these new commitments a reality by June 2026. This conversation will explore what has changed for the Commission since the Pact's adoption, where its current priorities lie and what it will take going forward to ensure a functioning, resourceful and flexible European migration system.

This session discusses current migration priorities, the future of Ukrainian refugees under temporary protection, and plans for Polish Council Presidency.

The next five years: Dealing with black swans and staying the course

With the daunting reform task of getting ready to implement the EU Pact underway across the Union, what should be on the agenda as the new Commission starts work in earnest in January 2025? How will governments navigate rising irregular entries and asylum claims whilst trying to attract international talent and essential foreign workers? Have the black swans of the past few years prepared us for what may await around the next corner? What needs to be on our radar for the coming five years?
